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IMPORTANT NOTES

1. For airstrips on Outback Beds member properties you MUST contact the property owners for PERMISSION to land and other essential local information. See our webpage for contact details at www.outbackbeds.com.au
2. If landing at a town airport or public community airstrip, normal aviation protocols apply.
3. Do not rely on properties or public community airstrips to have aviation fuel. Check on fuel and other supplies during your prior trip planning.
4. This is not a complete map of all the airstrips in Western NSW and South West Queensland. This is a list of airstrips and airports that have either a local taxi service to the Outback Bed accommodation, a car hire company, or the Outback Bed property will organise a transfer from the airstrip to their accommodation.

TOP 10 SUGGESTIONS FOR ENJOYING YOUR OUTBACK BED FLYING ADVENTURE

1. Enjoy landing at Noccundra airstrip and taxiing right up to the pub verandah.
2. Make an Outback Bed property your base for flying trips to Lake Eyre, Wilpena Pound, a scenic flight over the Warrumbungle Ranges, or as a stop over to visiting Ayers Rock or the Birdsville or Boulia Races.
3. Fly to Lake Paika and organise a tour to Yanga National Park or the Mungo World Heritage Area, stopping for a pizza dinner on the way home at the historic Homebush Hotel.
4. Fly to Lightning Ridge and take a tour that collects you from Fossicker's Cottages and takes you to the Sheepyards opal area and the classic pub or try some in town opal fossicking.
5. Try flying with dinosaurs with a trip to Eromanga Natural History Museum and get a courtesy lift into town for dinner at the lovely Royal Hotel. Or for live animals, there is always something new at the Dubbo Zoo.
6. Fly to an outback Picnic Race Day:
 - Broken Hill's St Pats races in March
 - Louth Races in August
 - Lightning Ridge Easter double, the rodeo on Friday and the races on Saturday
 - Hire a car at Dubbo and attend a picnic race like the Wellington Boot, the Geurie races, the Cotton Cup (Warren), Duck Creek Races (Nyngan), or the Mungery Races (Narromine)
7. Do an Outback Pub Crawl. The options are near limitless but here are some suggestions:
 - Family Hotel Tibooburra (there's nothing nicer than sitting out the front of the Family in the evening and watching the world go by in this intriguing gold town)
 - Stop over for a pub lunch at Tilpa (courtesy car available) or Packsaddle Roadhouse, the Royal at Eromanga or Shindy's Inn at Louth to name a few
 - Nuccundra Hotel (taxi right up to the pub and your accommodation)
 - Broken Hill (you will be spoiled for choice with over a dozen operating classic outback pubs in Australia's first heritage listed town)
8. Land at an Outback Bed property and take a Farm tour (you don't need your own car) at Kallara Station, Trilby Station, Corynnia Station and Kilcowera Station. Station activities are seasonal.
9. Pack your fishing gear and fish the Darling River at Bindara, Kallara, Neila Gaari or Trilby Station or hold your office's next golf day at Nelia Gaari's 9 hole bush golf course.
10. Celebrating? Indulge in a weekend of glitter and fashion at the Broken Heel festival (Sept).
